Mayor Canfield leads with the Pledge of Allegiance and then requests a motion to approve agenda at 5:30pm. It was then moved by Brewer 2nd by Ragsdale to approve agenda with vote being all eyes motion carries absent Banwarth.

Bill Close representing the Friends of the Library talked about the vitality to community growth and how the community can be served better. He explained an opportunity has been presented to the Friends of the Library and the fundraising and donations to help this opportunity become a reality for the city. This brought a motion by Johnson to approve the opportunity once a written proposal to the city is received by the Friends of the Library and reviewed and accepted by the Mayor 2nd by Ragsdale with the vote being all eyes motion carries. MINUTES AND PROCEEDINGS OF A REGULAR MEETING OF THE BUTLER COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS HELD ON FEBRUARY 24, 2026.

Meeting called to order at 9:00 A.M. by Greg Barnett with members Wayne Dralle and Rusty Eddy present. Motioned by Dralle, second by Eddy to approve the agenda. All ayes. Motion carried.

Motioned by Dralle, second by Eddy to approve the February 17th minutes. All ayes. Motion carried.

During Public Comment Ruth Saulsbury, Clarksville, provided an update regarding the Midwater BESS, LLC application for the Battery Energy Storage Project with the projected site located near the Shell Rock River outside Glenville, MN.

The Iowa Appeals Court upheld the District Court's ruling that county ordinances cannot interfere with federal safety standards and pipeline routing decisions made at the State level. Shelby & Story County requested that the US Supreme Court look at this ruling which they ultimately denied in January of 2026, making the Iowa Appeals Court

decision the final ruling in this case and making our pipeline ordinance invalid to enforce. Zoning Administrator Misty Kofron and County Attorney Dave Kuehner were present to discuss. Based on the current verbiage in our zoning ordinance no additional action will be taken at this time.

The Board discussed the application for Congresswoman Ashley Hinson Community Project Funding. Katie LaBree from the Butler-Grundy Development Board shared a brief description of a water waste collection project that would be in Butler County Logistics Park. Butler-Grundy Development Board wishes to apply for the funding on behalf of the county. Motioned by Dralle, second by Eddy to approved Resolution #20-2026. Roll was called and the resolution was approved as follows: Resolution #20-2026

A Resolution of Butler County approving an application to Congresswoman Ashley Hinson for Community Project Funding and directing execution of said application by the Board of Supervisors.

Moved by Dralle and seconded by

Eddy to approve the following resolution: WHEREAS, Butler Logistics Park is located in rural Butler County, and is a significant driver of economic development, employment, and private sector investment in our county and our region.

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of Butler County to avail itself of financial assistance through the Community Project Funding Program.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of Butler County as follows:

- 1) The Community Project Funding application for the expansion of the wastewater collection system at Butler Logistics Park is approved and endorsed by the Board of Supervisors.
- 2) Local match funding will be provided using Tax Increment Financing (TIF) proceeds.
- 3) Butler-Grundy Development Alliance is the lead economic development organization serving Butler County, for which a 28E agreement is in place, and will serve as the primary point of contact for this ap-

plication.

County Engineer John Riherd, shared updates for the proposed Secondary Road regional maintenance shed construction. Plans are near 90-95% complete and they are ready to set a public hearing date for March 10, 2026, at 9:00 A.M.

As co-chair of the Together 4 Families (T4F) Early Childhood Iowa (ECI) Area Board shared Shawna Lebeck's resignation as ECI Director. At this time the FMC and T4F local boards and HHS are working on a transition plan to finish out the FY26 fiscal duties. Administrative Assistant Gloria Carr will take on some responsibilities in the short term. ECI funding continues to be discussed this legislative session;

therefore, a new ECI Director position will not be posted at this time. More information to come as future funding decisions are made at the state level.

During the BY27 Budget Workshop Kari Coates, EMS Coordinator, shared an updated budget worksheet. The updates include reduced car expenses and new car lines items. These budget expense reductions result in a FY27 EMS levy of \$.020733. Groen shared the Supervisor budget was reduced by removing the Budget Director expense line because of ongoing confusion surrounding Compensation Board recommendations, stipends, etc. Plans to designate a Budget Director will continue, but there will not be compensation budgeted for FY27. The Board went on to review FY27 total budget expenses, funding requests, levy rates and the proposed budget publication notice. They discussed the confusion surrounding the publication and budget statement mailing to taxpayers. Next week's agenda will include approval of the FY27 proposed budget and setting a date and time for the

public hearing.

During the Engineer's update Riherd explained they have submitted the application for the BUILD grant, will have a RISE grant application ready in a few weeks. There will also be an Urban Renewal/TIF workshop scheduled soon.

Motioned by Eddy second by Dralle to approve claims. All ayes. Motion carried.

Motioned by Dralle second by Eddy to adjourn the regular meeting at 9:57 A.M. to March 3, 2026, at 9:00 A.M. All ayes. Motion carried.

Mayor Mike Timmer called the meeting to order and led those in attendance in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

There was a motion by Cuvelier, seconded by Cleary to approve the minutes. Upon vote, all ayes.

There was a motion by Cleary, seconded by Madsen to approve the bills. Upon vote, all ayes.

There was a motion by Cleary, seconded by Madsen to approve the Mayoral appointments of BJ Humphrey and Kate Durbin to the Planning & Zoning Board and Megan Humphrey to the Board of Adjustments. Upon vote, all ayes.

A Public Works update was provided. This included information regarding the repairs made to the three Main Lift Station pumps and repairs ongoing at the Water Plant.

There was a motion by Cuvelier, seconded by Cleary to accept the low bid from VanWall John Deere for the trade-in and replacement of the city's lawn mowers, small tractor, and snow blower equipment subject to the city trying to sell the used equipment outright before trading it in. Upon vote, all ayes.

There was a motion by Madsen, seconded by Cleary to recognize Genivve Smith as a new member to the Parkersburg Ambulance Service. Upon vote, all ayes.

There was discussion concerning the updated covenants as approved by Parkersburg Economic Development. Alex Bellows explained that the covenants provided are an updated version that have not been amended or recorded for many years. There was discussion about additional changes recommended to address future ownership of the lots, utilities being required, and the covenant requirements being enforced as a condition of sale in the future. There was a motion by Cleary, seconded by Cuvelier to adopt Resolution 1193 approving the updated PED Business/Industrial Park Covenants. Upon vote, all ayes.

There was a motion by Cuvelier, seconded by Madsen to approve the 2ND Reading of Ordinance 392 providing for the division of taxes levied on taxable property in the 2026 Parkersburg Housing Urban Renewal Area, Pursuant to Section 403.19 of the Code of Iowa. Upon roll call vote: all ayes.

There was a motion by Cuvelier, seconded by Cleary to waive the required three readings for Ordinance 392. Upon roll call vote, all ayes.

There was a motion by Cleary, seconded by Cuvelier to adopt Ordinance 392 providing for the division of taxes levied on taxable property in the 2026 Parkersburg Housing Urban Renewal Area, Pursuant to Section 403.19 of the Code of Iowa. Upon roll call vote: all ayes.

Mayor Timmer opened the public hearing on the proposed Development Agreement with Lynx Properties LLC. No written comments were submitted for or against the proposed agreement. The City Clerk stated that many individuals provided verbal comments in support of any future housing development. Engineer Lee Gallentine provided an aerial layout and design of the perspective subdivision. He also stated that a preliminary plat will be available for consideration by the Planning and Zoning Board very soon. Upon no further comments, Mayor Timmer closed the public hearing.

There was a motion by Cuvelier, seconded by Madsen to adopt Resolution 1191 approving the Development Agreement with Lynx Properties LLC, authorizing annual appropriation tax increment payments and pledging certain tax increment revenues to the payment of the agreement. Upon vote, all ayes.

onded by Cuvelier to approve plans, specifications, form of contract, and engineer's estimate. Upon vote, all ayes.

There was discussion about the plans and Engineer Gallentine provided the bids received to replace the brine tank at the Water Plant. He explained the bid process and the errors in the bids received, including from the low bidder. After discussion, there was a motion by Cuvelier, seconded by Cleary to adopt Resolution 1194 to award the contract to Blazek Corp out of Lawler, Iowa for \$142,050.00 and to waive the non-financial irregularities in the bid received. Upon vote, all ayes.

There was a motion by Cuvelier, seconded by Cleary to adopt Resolution 1195 appointing Matt Waller to fill City Council vacancy. Upon vote, all ayes.
